GARAGE FIRE SAFETY

In the last few months, within Maricopa County, Rural Metro Fire has responded to approximately 24 structure fires. The causes and origins vary. However, fires originating in an attached garage are trending up. Nationally, there are 6,600 garage fires per year. Resulting in 30 deaths, 400 injuries, and over \$457 million in property loss.

What causes garage fires? Electrical malfunction is the leading cause of garage fires. Electrical malfunctions occur when wires are damaged, shorts occur within the wire or appliance, or electrical outlets and circuits are overloaded.

For example, if you have a refrigerator in your garage, plugged into a standard 120V outlet. That refrigerator is drawing anywhere from 2 amps for a mini-fridge to 8.5 amps for a side-by-side fridge. Standard outlets can typically handle up to 15 amps. A refrigerator under normal operation draws 7-10 amps. However, during start up it can demand up to 3 times that. This can pose a threat to overloading circuits if they are not properly grounded or equipped with a GFCI (Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter). A GFCI is the little button that "pops" or "trips" when the circuit is temporarily overloaded, cutting power as a safety measure. Many garages have one maybe two outlets, a garage door opener, and a light on the same circuit, all of which draw from the same pool of amps. Hazards are produced when additional demands are placed on the circuit, such as charging car or golf cart batteries, charging hand tool batteries, adding televisions in the garage, or any number of other electrical demands.

Rural Metro Fire offers Carefree residents a free annual home safety inspection. During these inspections it is common to find homeowners using the wrong size/rated extension cord to power large appliances such as freezers or refrigerators and having single outlets powering numerous electrical appliances.

Preventing Garage Fires

- Store oil, gasoline, paints, propane and varnishes in a shed away from your home.
- Keep items that can burn on shelves away from appliances.
- Plug only one charging appliance into an outlet.
- Don't use an extension cord when charging an appliance.

Install:

- A 20-minute fire-rated door that is self-closing and self-latching from the garage into the house.
- A ceiling made with %-inch Type X gypsum board (or the equivalent) if you have living space above the garage.
- A wall with ½-inch gypsum board (or the equivalent) if the wall attaches the garage to your home.
- An attic hatch cover if you have attic access from the garage.
- A heat alarm not a smoke alarm in your garage. The heat alarm will sound if the temperature rises too high.

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GARAGE FIRE SAFETY (continued)

Second to electrical caused fires in an attached garage are fires caused by vehicles. Parking a vehicle inside an attached garage potentially introduces another ignition source and a fuel source. Vehicles are rarely the single cause of any fire, but more likely a link in the chain leading to a garage fire. Tips for mitigating the danger of garage fires:

Have any manufacture recalls repaired as soon as possible:

 Not all recalls can cause a fire. Manufacturers such as Tesla, Ford, and Chevy have issued recalls for Hybrid, Electric, and Gas-powered vehicles recently. Check your vehicle for open recalls.

Maintain your vehicle

 Neglect or poor maintenance can lead to hazardous conditions from leaks or electrical issues.

Beware of overheating Catalytic Converters:

 If your engine isn't operating efficiently, you're not using the right fuel grade, or any number of other adverse conditions the catalytic converter can become clogged and overheat reaching temperatures of up to 1400. This damages the catalytic converter itself and risks melting or igniting surrounding vehicle parts, leaking fluids, or greasy build-up.

Electrical system failures are the leading cause of vehicle fires:

- Check for a healthy battery, free from corrosion or leaks
- Look for damaged wiring
- If you experience electrical problems with your vehicle, have it inspected or repaired by a professional mechanic.

Reducing risk of fire throughout your home should be a high priority. Rural Metro Fire is committed to making sure you, your family, and your property are safe. Taking advantage of the annual home safety inspection and implementing the above safety tips will increase the safety for you, your family, and your property.
